
WA State Senate Bill 5878, 3/30/22

The **legislature intends to clarify**, for schools and school districts, the importance of arts education and to bring our schools' practices in line with our state and federal laws and policies, and the promises made to our communities, by ensuring formal instruction in the core disciplines of visual and performing arts for all Washington students, regardless of their family's socioeconomic status or the relative affluence of the neighborhood in which they live. The <u>legislature recognizes and supports that the best practice is for basic</u> education courses, including the arts, to be taught by certificated teachers who are qualified through an endorsement to teach in the subject area of the course.

WA State Senate Bill 5878, 3/30/22



- Arts instruction must be
 - accessible by all students, in a way that is consistent with instruction in other core subject areas like Math, Reading, and Writing.
 - taught by teacher endorsed in the art discipline
 - Arts teachers in the district determine what is taught at each grade level

- **Whereas** Shelton View PTA believes that the visual arts are central to learning and that including visual arts courses in elementary education is key to the development of students;
- Whereas visual arts are recognized as a core academic subject in Washington state, and under the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA), and is also considered part of a well-rounded education under Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA);
- **Whereas** Senate Bill 5878 was passed in March 2022 by an overwhelming majority in the WA Legislature. The Bill specifically notes that many schools are not adequately providing a range of Arts instruction to the youngest learners and states "The evidence of the multiple benefits of arts education is voluminous and undeniable. The arts are not only a vehicle for doing better at other subjects; they have immense value in their own right and should be taught as stand-alone disciplines, the way our laws and policies are written.";
- Whereas students succeed in social emotional learning with an education in the visual arts. The arts help students to find their own voice and identity. The visual arts increase engagement and emotional connection;
- Whereas visual arts in education helps our communities. Studies show that students who are exposed to an arts education exhibit greater understanding of cultures other than their own and engage more in civic opportunities;
- Whereas visual arts education helps students of all abilities succeed. Visual arts education provides increased academic, social, and functional skill development and knowledge which can play a crucial role in their overall success. All students of diverse abilities can be successful through the arts;
- Whereas the visual arts prepare students for the future. Creativity is one of the top five applied skills sought by business leaders. Low-income students who receive an arts education are twice as likely to attend college as those who receive no arts education;
- Whereas Northshore School District has not had certified visual arts specialists in the elementary schools since 1967 while other school districts in our state currently do, such as Everett Public Schools, Bellevue School District, Seattle Public Schools, Mercer Island Public Schools, Olympia Public Schools, Vancouver Public Schools; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, that Shelton View PTA:

- Will advocate for the implementation of visual arts instruction as a core subject in Northshore elementary schools taught by visual art specialists, as noted in SB5878, "Every student must have access to arts education, as part of basic education..."
- Will forward a copy of this resolution to the Northshore School Board and the Northshore Council PTSA.
